History of Men in Nursing

- India: 250 BC: first nursing school was started—only men were considered pure
- Civil War: Male nurses on the front lines, women in hospitals
- 1888: separate school for men in nursing
- 1901: Army formed Army Corps of Nurses—accepted only females. This fateful decision led to the current domination of women in nursing...

History continues

- 1955: Korean war men allowed to serve as army nurses
- 1982: Men finally have full access to statesponsored nursing schools
- 1970-2011: 3x increase from 2-7-9.6%.
- Women: \$51, 100Men: \$60,700



Barriers to Men in Nursing

- Perception of higher expectations for men
- Outnumbered—may be more visible and face extra scrutiny
- Treated differently—
- confused for a Dr.
- expected to help with lifting, with combative patients, etc.
- may miss out on scholarships.
- may have patients who don't want a male nurse.

Sex and Gender

- Sex is biological
- Gender is learned, reinforced, internalized or altered
- Gender was thought to be a continuum
 Now conceptualized as
- Now conceptualized as two separate continuums

Gender Socialization

- From infancy to 4-5, boys are more emotive than girls:
 - Smile more
 - Look at mother more
 - Fuss, cry, and show anger more
 - Gesture to be picked up more
- At 15-16, begin to show gender stereotyping



Consequences of Gender Stereotyping

- Men are socialized to be competitive and to lead
- Men tend to play more team sports
- Men have higher rates of heart attacks, suicide, and substance abuse
- 2012: 71% of women and 61% of men enroll in college after HS
- Women spend more time on homework
- Women confide in friends, partners, and family
- Men are likely to confide only in their partners

Gender and Communication

- Women Use Communication to:
 - Create and maintain relationships
 - Establish egalitarian relationships
 - Include others
 - Show sensitivity to others
 - Praise others

- Men Utilize Communication to
 - Assert ideas, opinions and identity
 - Achieve something, solve problems, develop strategies
 - Attract and maintain others' attention
 - Compete and stand out



Strategies to Achieve Power

- Overt Communication
- "You need to take your medicine."
- Persuasion
- "Please take your medicine."
- Setting the agenda
- "It's medication time..."Terms of endearment
- "Please take your medicine for me, honey."
- Flexibility and versatility in approach can lead to greater effectiveness for both men and women in nursing.



Caring: Masculine and Feminine Models

- Caring is traditionally associated with women and femininity
- Gender differences are not usually addressed by nursing faculty
 Women are socialized to
- Women are socialized to show emotions and use touch
- Men tend to treat patients more like friends and joke with them

When the Patient Refuses

- Happens rarely
- It's not about you—it's about the patient
- We are always patient advocates first
- Build an account with your co-workers



Substance Use

- Nurses and other healthcare professionals are more likely to abuse substances than the general population
- Minorities are at higher risk
- Males are at higher risk



Advantages for Men in Nursing

- Earn more than women
- Occupy more leadership roles (are socialized to go after leadership spots)
- Are more likely to be hired and promoted (competitiveness is seen as a desirable trait in men)
- Have better relationships with physicians
- Patriarchal system in healthcare
