What does a CRNA do?


• Examine pts medical history, allergies, or illnesses to ensure a safe anesthesia




What does a CRNA do?

- Provide pre/intra/post operative care to patients
- Administers anesthesia during surgical, therapeutic, diagnostic and obstetric procedures.
- Perform Epidural, Spinal, or other nerve blocks
